

Kimball City Council
Regular Meeting
February 21, 2017

A regular meeting of the Mayor and City Council was convened in open and public session at 6:00 p.m. on February 21, 2017 in the City Council Chambers. Mayor Prunty and Council members Shields, Warner, and Baliman were present. Council member Schnell was absent. Also present were City Attorney Hadenfeldt, City Administrator Dean, Police Chief Bremer, Landfill Superintendent Schulte, Special Projects Coordinator Sapp, City Treasurer Sisk and City Clerk Russell. The public was represented.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication in the Western Nebraska Observer. Notice of the meeting was given to the members and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is on record at the office of the City Clerk. Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice to the members. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public except as otherwise indicated.

Prunty called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Baliman moved and Shields seconded to excuse the absence of Council member Schnell from this meeting. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Warner, Shields, and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Prunty acknowledged the posted Open Meetings Act poster.

At 6:02 p.m. Prunty opened a public hearing for rezoning Block 2, Lots 13 & 14, Lockwood's Addition to the City of Kimball, Kimball County, Nebraska, also known as 503 E. 3rd Street, Kimball, Nebraska, from Single Family Residential District (R-1) to Light Commercial District (C-2)

There were no comments from the public and it was indicated that Planning Commission recommended approval. There being no further comments, Prunty declared the public hearing closed at 6:03 p.m.

Warner moved and Baliman seconded to introduce Ordinance 742 and waive the requirement of reading on three different days. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Mayor Prunty read Ordinance 742 by title only.

ORDINANCE NO. 742

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING CERTAIN PARCELS FROM SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL (R-1) TO LIGHT COMMERCIAL DISTRICT (C-2) PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE AND PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM.

Baliman moved and Shields seconded to pass and approve Ordinance 742. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

At 6:04 p.m. Prunty opened a public hearing for rezoning Block 19, Lots 5, 6, &7, South Park Addition to the City of Kimball, Kimball County, Nebraska, also known as 808/810 South Elm Street, Kimball, Nebraska, from Single Family Residential (R-1) to Light Industrial District (I-1).

Prunty indicated this is on the property owned by George Risk Industries (GRI) and GRI wishes to rezone this to correspond with the other property zoning in that area. The Planning Commission has recommended approval. There being no further comments, Prunty declared the public hearing closed at 6:05 p.m.

Baliman moved and Warner seconded to introduce Ordinance 743 and waive the requirement of reading on three different days. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Mayor Prunty read Ordinance 743 by title only.

ORDINANCE NO. 743

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING OF CERTAIN PARCELS FROM SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL (R-1) TO LIGHT INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT (I-1) PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE AND PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM.

Shields moved and Baliman seconded to pass and approve Ordinance 743. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Mayor Prunty read a proclamation honoring George Risk Industries for celebrating 50 years of business in 2016.

Beth Ackland, Director of Retail Gas Services, NMPP Energy and the Public Alliance for Community Energy (ACE) presented information on ACE. The City is well-represented on the ACE Board with Jim Cederburg and Bill Hinton. ACE is commemorating their 20

year anniversary. Ackland explained that Black Hills Energy will always be the distributor; however, the Choice Gas Program allows customers to choose a supplier.

In 2016, 89% of ACE customers chose to lock in a fixed rate and 23% of those selected the absolute certainty of ACE WeatherShield, a fixed monthly bill pricing option not available outside of the Choice Gas Program in Nebraska.

Kimball is one of the oldest members of ACE and ACE has grown from 23 to 73 communities in Nebraska. ACE was formed in 1998 and to date ACE has returned more than \$1.8 million to Nebraska communities. Customers who chose their gas supplier often save \$100 or more per year over those who don't. ACE gives a voice to municipal members and has been very active with the Public Service Commission. In 2016, ACE intervened and received some important considerations when Black Hills Energy acquired Source Gas.

Ackland explained that there is a minimum of three and a maximum of six choices every year and competition is good. ACE remains the one constant year after year. Ackland presented a check for \$3,773.00 representing Kimball's member distribution for 2016.

Prunty asked council members to think about where they wish to allocate this money and it will be on the next council agenda for discussion and action.

Jan Sears, Library Director, presented the Library semi-annual report. The Library is open nearly 2,000 hours per year. There are 25,454 items in inventory for checkout. The Library received a grant last year for \$1,000 for two Library interns. The Nebraska Library Commission has just awarded the Kimball Library another internship grant.

The Library continues to provide services to all people in Kimball and the surrounding area through the availability of meeting rooms, children's programs, young adult and adult programs, interlibrary loan service, computers for public use, wireless internet access and a fax machine.

There were over 11,000 visits to the Library, over 11,000 physical items checked out and nearly 2,000 eBooks on Nebraska Overdrive. Library staff is working on purging of the Library patron records and all cards that haven't been used since 2012 are being deleted except for suspended patrons.

The Library activities include: a weekly Wednesday preschool story time; Club Next, the Fictionista Girls Book Club, the adult Brown Bag Book Club, several adult programs, the Library Board hosted the second annual 5K run; an Entrepreneurship Camp; and a 3-D printer camp.

The Friends of the Library continue to support the library through their fundraising efforts. The Library will celebrate their 50th anniversary in the current Library building in April 2017.

Shields inquired if Sears has concerns with her current budget and Sears said they are holding their own but it is tight. They are keeping on top of the programs but it is difficult to keep up behind the scenes. Shields extended his appreciation to Sears for her hard work. Sears said it is worth keeping the Library open. It is a good Library for this size of community. Council members thanked Sears.

Prunty opened discussion on the recommendation from the Economic Development Committee on a grant from CDBG Reuse funds for Keep Kimball Beautiful. Prunty indicated that the Economic Development Committee has recommended granting \$7,000 for support of Keep Kimball Beautiful activities.

Annette Brower, KKB President, commented on budgetary concerns and cutting employee hours. KKB is requesting assistance from the CDBG funds to help bring the employees hours back up in order to do more with the recycling. The more hours they can work, the more they can work with the recycling and awareness programs. KKB is excited about the new relationship with the City. Warner expressed her appreciation for all the effort the KKB Board is putting forth in moving forward.

There being no further discussion, Warner moved and Baliman seconded to approve the \$7,000 grant from CDBG Reuse funds for Keep Kimball Beautiful. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on the Keno grant application from the Potter-Dix Post Prom. Mike Reuter, PO Box 696, Kimball, indicated they are requesting funds to be used to host a safe and secure post prom party and would appreciate any amount. They plan to bring in some fun jumps and provide food and games and will try to send everyone home with a prize. They are half way to their goal and have sent out letters to businesses for donations as well. Their goal last year was \$5,000.

Prunty commented on Kimball funds for Kimball people. Baliman said that she knows that 90 percent of Potter-Dix residents use our local businesses to buy corsages for the prom. Warner indicated that they do support Kimball businesses and moved to grant \$1,500. After further discussion, Warner amended her motion to approve the Keno grant application from the Potter-Dix Post Prom for \$750.00. Shields seconded. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on the Keno grant application from Kimball Federation Wrestling Club. Bob Culek, 500 S. Howard Street, indicated that the Federation Wrestling Club consists of 38 boys and girls. They are fortunate that they get to use the high school; however, the Wrestling Club purchases the mats which cost \$12,000 to \$13,000. They also put on a tournament and bring in 1,000 or more people to Kimball. Culek said they try to supply equipment for the kids and help fund the cards for the high school kids so they can go to tournaments.

The Wrestling Club needs to purchase singlets and head gear and they plan to purchase 50 singlets at \$80 each and headgear at \$15 each. Baliman commented that wrestling teaches sportsmanship, teamwork and comradery.

There being no further discussion, Shields moved and Baliman seconded to approve the Keno grant application from Kimball Federation Wrestling Club for \$2,500. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on a Keno grant application from the Kimball Police Department. Bremer commented that the Police Department vehicles are pretty worn out. The three Crown Victorias are in varying stages of disorder and are mechanically worn out. The Durango and Explorer are also getting pretty worn out. Bremer has set up a regular maintenance schedule with Wolf Automotive.

Bremer commented that now the Police Department is required to take juveniles to eastern Nebraska for any arrests. He would like to purchase a 4 wheel drive pick up because the resale value is better and it is more of a utilitarian vehicle. Bremer has priced out a vehicle on the state bid and it will cost \$31,000 with an additional \$6,000 to set up the needed equipment on the vehicle.

Bremer said he make sure to budget for vehicles every year. The pickup is a Ford Eco-Boost six cylinder. Ford can paint the vehicle the same color as the current Police vehicles. Prunty has spoken to Mike Petco at Wolf Automotive and commented on keeping the purchase local. He is looking for the Police Officers to have dependable vehicles they can use.

Hadenfeldt commented on the community betterment program and indicated the proceeds are to be used for civic activities and very rarely should they be used for budgetary items. However, historically, the City has granted them for budgetary items. Hadenfeldt commented that the concern is if Keno funds are relied on for the budget process, it will hinder the budget process. The Police vehicles are obviously something that need to be budgeted every year.

Warner expressed her appreciation to Bremer on keeping under budget. Prunty commented that the amount requested includes the light bar.

There being no further discussion, Baliman moved and Warner seconded to approve the Keno grant application from the Kimball Police Department for up to \$40,000 to be disbursed from the Keno trust funds. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on a resolution of support for participation in the Nebraska Department of Economic Development's Leadership Certified Community Program. Sapp indicated that some of the legwork for this certification has been done; however, one of the first things is to get support and PADD and WNED have provided letters of

support. Only 17 Nebraska communities have certified status and Sapp indicated that receiving this certification provides bonus points for grants. It also lays the groundwork to put a strategic plan in place. Sapp plans to provide updates on the progress at each council meeting.

Warner indicated that as part of WNED Kimball would be one of a few communities to get this completed. WNED is urging all communities to get this done. Sapp said that one of the grants available is a \$300,000 downtown revitalization grant. She also commented on business retention visits.

There being no further discussion, Shields moved and Warner seconded to approve the following resolution.

Prunty opened discussion on establishing a veterans rate for the Fitness Center. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on his appointment of Dan Dean as the alternate representative to the PADD Board. There being no discussion, Baliman moved and Shields seconded to approve the Mayor's appointment of Dan Dean as the alternate representative to the PADD Board. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on the City Maintenance Agreement No. 78. Dean indicated this agreement is a continuation of the agreement as in the past and the amount remains the same.

There being no further discussion, Baliman moved and Shields seconded to approve the City Maintenance Agreement No. 78 with the Nebraska Department of Roads. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Discussion was held on City-owned property. Sapp indicated that this discussion is to determine the City's intentions for the following City-owned property.

(1) Community Gardens, Lot 1, Hull's Subdivision. At one time there were many people using the Community Gardens and last year there was only one family using the gardens. Baliman indicated it has been lacking a ramrod behind it. Sapp asked for suggestions on getting this going again and Baliman indicated it was volunteers behind it. Jim Cederburg, Board of Public Works Chair, said that it was previously taken care of by Travis and Danessa Terrill. Sapp suggested putting an ad in the paper to market it. Council members agree the Community Gardens should be marketed. Discussion was held on the stipulations and Baliman suggested Sapp talk to the Terrills.

(2) West 9th Street, Big Sky Addition, Block 1, Lot 5. Ryan McElroy indicated that this was purchased because it was planned to continue Howard Street south. Sapp

inquired about the goal of this property going forward and Warner indicated she would love to see new houses and recommended marketing that property for sale. Dean inquired that if it was originally obtained to extend a right of way through it, is it something the City should reserve. After some discussion, it was indicated to retain a right of way and sell the property. Dean will research the property further to determine where the right of way should be obtained.

(3) North County Road, Frederick Addition, Block 1, Lot 1. Sapp indicated this property is located next to Eatmon Oil. It is a little square lot and the City doesn't have a use for it and the Oil Company doesn't want the property either.

(4) Old WWTP on North Myrtle Street. Sapp indicated that PADD has reviewed this property and it is believed that this cannot be redeveloped into anything the City could utilize. Phase 1 and 2 assessments should be done on this property.

(5) 818 S. Chestnut Street (sign). Sapp indicated the City of Kimball owns the property; however, the garage on this lot belongs to the Barretts until they pass away. Sapp commented on changing the sign.

(6) Janicek Dam. Sapp indicated that someone has expressed interest in purchasing this property for a horse pasture. Warner commented on Marketing Hometown America's ideas of having a walking trail in that area. For little to no expense a walking trail could be put around the dam. Sapp indicated that the Kimball Area Foundation is bringing this to the forefront as something they want to work on. Warner commented on the requirement of swapping land for recreational use if there would be homes at the golf course. She also commented on the idea of a dog park.

It was the consensus that the City keep the Community Garden and Dean and Sapp market the other properties for sale.

Prunty opened discussion on Ordinance 744 to amend Title III, Administration, Section 31.04 of the Kimball Municipal Code pertaining to merger of City Administrator with other duties. Dean indicated this is cleaning up the Administrator duties in the Code Book. The first thing he did when starting in Kimball was to start reading the Code Book and this clean up ordinance eliminates the duties that others are doing.

There being no further discussion, Warner moved and Shields seconded to introduce Ordinance 744 and waive the requirement of reading on three different days. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: Schnell. Motion carried.

Mayor Prunty read Ordinance 744 by title only.

Dean reported he attended the PADD and WNED meetings and had a number of meetings with several businesses.

Dean reported the City is doing a cleanup on a house and a good portion is done. He expressed kudos to the Street Department and other crews. The cleanup is moving forward and there is about \$7,000 worth of costs already.

Dean reported he attended the Library Board meeting and the Kimball Area Foundation meeting.

Dean reported he has been working on fuel bids and has received bids from Frenchmen Valley Cooperative (FVC) and Panhandle Cooperative. The bid from FVC is slightly less.

Dean reported he and Sapp participated in a conference call with Heartland Expressway. Heartland is part of the Ports to Plains highway system. Dean was invited to participate in a fly-in to Washington, DC the end of April to meet with Congressional delegations in support of the Ports to Plains and Heartland Expressway.

Dean reported there is some interest in having a joint City Council and Board of Public Works meeting on March 7, 2017 to receive information from MEAN.

Prunty reported he has been working closely with Dean and he is doing a great job. He reiterated that the abatement process has begun on the Eby property and the City crews are doing a very good job.

The next City Council meeting will be held on March 21, 2017 at 6:00 p.m.
