

Kimball City Council
Regular Meeting
April 18, 2017

A regular meeting of the Mayor and City Council was convened in open and public session at 6:00 p.m. on April 18, 2017 in the City Council Chambers. Mayor Prunty and Council members Shields, Schnell, Warner, and Baliman were present. Also present were City Attorney Hadenfeldt, City Administrator Dean, Landfill Superintendent Schulte, Special Projects Coordinator Sapp, City Treasurer Sisk, and City Clerk Russell. The public was represented.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication in the Western Nebraska Observer. Notice of the meeting was given to the members and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is on record at the office of the City Clerk. Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice to the members. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public except as otherwise indicated.

Prunty called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Prunty acknowledged the posted Open Meetings Act poster.

City Administrator Dean presented a check from ACE for \$325.00 to the Friends of the Goodhand Theater for distributing ACE door hangers. Also part of the presentation was Jeri Ferguson, whose high school civics class distributed the door hangers.

Prunty opened discussion on a request to build a remote car track on Janicek Dam property. Jerry Deines, manager of Z & S Construction, indicated that last year former City Administrator Ortiz had spoken with them about plans to put the Janicek Dam area to use. Z & S Construction would like to build a remote car track approximately 150 feet by 300 feet in the southeast corner of the dam area. They will provide all the labor and put the track together, along with a parking area. There is a chance that races could be put together for Farmer's Day.

Discussion was held on insurance and liability and Hadenfeldt indicated that the City will need to check with their insurance carrier to determine if this type of activity would be covered. Warner indicated that if Z & S Construction is blading the track, it might be worth the City's cost to pay for the insurance.

Discussion was held on the dog park area. Schnell said he likes the idea with the parking area. The parking area is in a high spot and there are electric lines in that area and better drainage for parking. Deines said they will skim the ground and haul the material (gravel) in and build it up. They will not dig into the ground and change the drainage.

Dean inquired if there are design standards for this type of facility and Deines indicated there was not. Dean indicated that some thought needs to be about insurance and the standards that are typically used to head off any liability. Deines said he can check with other cities that have this type of track and find out if they had standards to follow. Dean said that would be his only big concern, that whatever is built in that area will be acceptable insurance-wise. Baliman commented that Z & S Construction has supported this community and also commented on bringing people into town over the course of a weekend. She believes this needs to happen. Z & S Construction is volunteering to install and maintain the track.

Schnell indicated the City may need to check with the Army Corps of Engineers with regard to diversion. Warner reminded Schnell that the City has approval to move dirt except for the dam. Shields inquired if there is an active RC club with members and Deines said not in Kimball however there are in other Panhandle cities. Dean would like to see some type of agreement between the City and Z & S Construction if they are going to construct the track and maintain it. Shields expressed concern about starting this and then it not playing out. Deines said that Z & S Construction would put the top soil back in. Warner expressed appreciation that this is an actual step towards a recreation area.

There being no further discussion, Warner moved and Schnell seconded to give the council's blessing and direct Dean to move this forward and try to come up with a more solid plan and investigate insurance issues. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on closing 4th Street at Gotte Park. Mark Green, 417 Adams Street, Kimball, has spoken with Street Superintendent Shoup on this and the residents in that area would like to close 4th Street behind the alley at the entrance to Gotte Park to make it safer for kids. Shields indicated there is an average of eight cars a night that go through that area. Mr. Green had distributed a survey to the residents of Adams Street and many were in favor of closing 4th Street at Gotte Park to eliminate the traffic through the park.

Further discussion was held with regard to the traffic and cars using the alley during particular events. Green said the alley traffic doesn't really bother him, however, if the traffic is stopped at the park he believes the alley traffic will diminish.

Discussion was held on this area being blocked off in the 80's or 90's. Warner said when she was growing up, there was a chain across that area. Schulte indicated the garbage truck will have to have access to the alley. Shields inquired if Green's intent is to make it safer for kids to play in the street. Green said that is one of the benefits but it would also make the park safer.

Shields commented that he can see the east and northeast entrances and about half the park from his back yard. He sees a number of dogs at large and a large amount of traffic and drivers spinning donuts in the park. Discussion was held on closing that

portion temporarily. Dean indicated that staff has talked about this and Chief Bremer was involved in the discussion as well. Other than making sure the alley was open for the trash collection, staff had no issues with closing that portion. Hadenfeldt indicated that when a dedicated street is closed off, there could be some repercussions. Discussion was held on providing information prior to that area being closed to through traffic and Schnell suggested having a public hearing at the next meeting. Dean indicated that the dedicated 4th Street ends at the park area. It is platted east but not west. It wouldn't be blocking off 4th Street, it would be blocking off the park.

There being no further discussion, Schnell moved and Shields seconded to hold a public meeting on the closing of 4th Street at Gotte Park at the next meeting. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, and Warner. Nay: Baliman. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on the Keno fund guidelines and application. Shields inquired about the guidelines and application and if these are what the committee put together. He also commented on the minimum number of hours for community/volunteer service and inquired if this is included in what the organization has already done or in addition. Schnell used the Kimball Lions Club as an example and commented on their past projects. He said they have already outlined their community service by giving written definition of what they are doing. Schnell said that is what the committee is requesting.

Schnell said the council typically receives presentations from people and organizations and the council reminds them about the clean up days. However, people don't come back to assist. Shields inquired about the tracking of the community/voluntary hours and Schnell indicated it is up to the organization. Dean said the intent was more self-reporting rather than the City tracking it.

Discussion was held on providing invoices and Sapp commented on the Main Street Design and Improvement Program. The applications go through the approval process and the applicants know they will not receive their money until they have proof of what they have spent the funds on.

Ashley Thurin said she totally respects the council's thoughts on this and explained the reason they came to the City Council for the money is because they don't have the money to prepay for the singlets and that is the only concern. Discussion was held on providing a quote or invoice and Baliman indicated the council wants this to be user friendly but still not defeat the purpose.

Schnell commented that many other communities do not award Keno money, they use it for infrastructure. Schnell said that the committee discussed the options and wanted to keep the Keno funds available for use. Baliman commented on Keno funds for organizations and that after three years they should not have to request Keno funds any more. Schnell said that if it is a big event, they will need to request Keno funds.

There being no further discussion, Baliman moved and Schnell seconded to approve

the Keno fund guidelines and application as presented. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Baliman moved and Warner seconded to remove the Keno fund application from Tri-State Grapplers from table. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Makenna Thurin said they want to represent Kimball in the tournaments throughout the year. Ashley Thurin spoke on behalf of the team. She and her husband created a new, smaller wrestling club. There are no issues between them and the Kimball Wrestling Club (KWC). She noticed that the KWC always looks really nice with their matching singlets and wanted the Tri-State Grapplers to also look nice with matching singlets. As mentioned at the last meeting, Thurin gives back to the community by helping with youth basketball, she is on the VFW Auxiliary Board and she also helps with baseball. She puts in a lot of hours to keep the youth off of the streets. Thurin commented on fundraising. They are working with Carol's Nuts and Schwans. They also plan to do some fundraisers this summer, such as a car wash or a bake sale.

There being no further discussion, Baliman moved and Schnell seconded to approve the Keno grant application from Tri-State Grapplers for \$800.00. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

As Penny Hobbs was not in attendance, no action was taken on her Keno fund application.

Prunty opened discussion on the Keno fund application from Kimball Public Schools, School Health Office. Emily Stull, School Nurse, submitted a Keno application to purchase a new hearing screener for use in mandated school screenings. The machine currently in use for screens is over 20 years old and isn't capable of printing the necessary results needed for communication with other health providers. Schnell commented on the hearing and vision screenings done by the Lion's Club. Stull indicated that for the most part, people are not available during the time they need to be done. Prunty said the Lion's Club is only allowed one day to do the screenings. Stull said that hearing screenings can help diagnose many disorders and is very important.

Discussion was held on the school budgeting for this and Stull said there is no room in the school's budget. Baliman said she didn't feel right about this one; the school should do this because it is important. Baliman also commented on grants for this. Schnell suggested Stull get in contact with the school foundation for a grant and then come back to the City Council to request Keno funds for the remainder. No further action was taken on this request.

Prunty opened discussion on the Keno fund application from Kimball Junior/Senior High. Jeri Ferguson, Kimball Public Schools, indicated that the coaches and teachers

participated in an in-service training presented by John Underwood, founder of Life of an Athlete. They feel they need to try and change the atmosphere in Kimball High School. They are looking for a way to implement something to get the students to make better choices in all aspects of their life. Mitchell Schools has this program and has had a lot of success with it.

The program is a two day training at Chadron State College for \$325 per person. Ferguson has already submitted grants to the Kimball School Foundation. If they fall short of funds for this training, the three coaches are willing to put up their own money. The students selected are current sophomores and juniors. Shields inquired how the information will be disseminated after the training. Ferguson said the leadership group that is chosen will get together on a weekly basis. The training is coach-driven. Baliman suggested they approach the Booster Club and Kimball Area Foundation.

There being no further discussion, Warner moved and Shields seconded to approve the Keno grant application from Kimball Jr./Sr. High for \$1,712.00 to be paid from the City-side Keno funds. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, and Warner. Nay: Baliman. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Ferguson will provide an update to the City Council after the training.

Prunty opened discussion on the Keno fund application from Kimball Ranch Rodeo. Colby Lukassen indicated they anticipate in the coming years to be able to be fully funded with money raised by the rodeo as well as community fundraising events. They have plans for a donkey basketball game next year in hopes that they will be able to significantly reduce or eliminate their request for a Keno grant in the future.

Alex Engstrom said that every year they donate a portion of the proceeds to local non-profits. The Ranch Rodeo team enjoys putting on this event and donating to charities and there are numerous businesses that provide donations to them. Baliman said she is in favor of approving the request for \$1,000 knowing that they are working towards not coming back every year. Lukassen said they could probably be self-sufficient now but it might mean that they would have to cut back on donating to others.

There being no further discussion, Baliman moved and Shields seconded to approve the Keno grant application from Kimball Ranch Rodeo for \$1,000.00. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on the request to use Keno funds for the purchase of polo shirts for Fire, Police, Sheriff and Ambulance crews. Warner has the pleasure of working for the City and the County. At the end of the day, it doesn't matter who saves a life. The City and the County need to show some appreciation to the people who serve and Warner is trying to make an impact on the community. Warner approached each of the department heads to see if they would be willing to wear uniform polo shirts for functions such as Farmers Day. This makes a statement and reminds people that

the City and the County are here to serve them. The cost of the silk-screening would be \$10.00 for the back of the shirt and \$3.00 for the front and the cost of the shirt would total approximately \$25.00 per person. The \$1,000 would only cover the City Police and Fire Departments. The Sheriff is willing to pull out of his fund for his people. Everyone is willing to wear them at some of the community's functions. Warner would like the \$1,000 to be taken out of the City-side of Keno funds. Warner said the County is willing to pitch in as well. The hospital just got new uniforms and is not sure where the funding will come from.

Discussion was held on turning the shirts in when people leave and Warner indicated the shirts will be their shirts to keep. She said that Chief Bremer and Sheriff Gillway have talked about selling the shirts to the community but in a different color. Warner said this is a good way to recognize the volunteer staff.

There being no further discussion, Schnell moved and Baliman seconded to approve Keno funds in the amount of \$1,000.00 from the City side Keno funds to be used towards the purchase of polo shirts for Fire and Police Departments. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on the Main Street Design and Improvement Grant application from Clothes Minded Laundromat for a sign. Sapp indicated the sign is 4 foot x 6 foot, flag mounted, double sided. The total cost for the sign and labor is \$3,850.00. The Main Street Design and Improvement Grant Committee recommended approval of \$1,925.00.

There being no further discussion. Baliman moved and Warner seconded to approve the Main Street Design and Improvement Grant application from Clothes Minded Laundromat for \$1,925.00. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on approving and accepting the grant award for the Senior Handyman Project. Wendy Baker, Director of the Kimball Handyman Project, explained the services the Handyman Project provides. This project is funded with a grant from the Aging Office of Western Nebraska to help coordinate services to citizens 60 years of age and older in the Kimball community. The project provides three basic chore areas: lawn mowing, snow removal and housekeeping. By approving the grant, it will ensure the project continues through the upcoming fiscal year.

The goal of the Handyman Project is to help individuals remain in their home as long as they can. This is not based on income and is on a sliding scale. There are currently 21 clients enrolled in the program with four on the waiting list to receive services. Baker asked the City Council to approve the grant award as well as the contract for FY 17-18 so she can continue to provide those services. Baker also asked that if anyone knows of someone who can help provide some of the aforementioned services, to have them get in contact with her.

There being no further discussion, Baliman moved and Shields seconded to accept the contract and grant award from the Aging Office of Western Nebraska for the Kimball Senior Handyman Project. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner, and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Prunty opened discussion on the quote received for a new conveyor belt for the Landfill. Schulte indicated the City took over the Landfill in 1994 and in 1998 began bailing and a special conveyor was built at that time. The belt is now worn almost in two and needs to be replaced. Schulte said when the conveyor belt goes down, more air space is used in the Landfill.

Schulte received a quote from Karl W. Schmidt & Associates for an apron steel belt, new bearings and new sprockets. The machinist (labor) is not included in the quote and that work will be done by a local business for approximately \$6,800.00. The Board of Public Works recommended approval of the quote.

There being no further discussion, Schnell moved and Shields seconded to approve the quote received for a new conveyor belt and hardware from Karl W. Schmidt & Associates, Inc. for \$30,095.00. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner, and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Council members received a report on the cost of the street repair at the entrance to Phoenix Conoco, 1st Interstate Inn and the Diner. Dean indicated that Shoup received a quote of \$2,800.00 for the concrete to be repaired, sawed and replaced, labor not included. Dean and Prunty had spoken with the State about providing some in-kind service. In the meantime, Shoup installed some patch material for about \$750.00. Dean indicated if the City is to move forward on this, it needs to be included in the One and Six Year plan for next year.

Prunty commented on State Statute and Kimball Municipal Code pertaining to driveway approaches. He indicated the City will try to help out as much as they can but it shouldn't be part of the City's responsibility. Prunty added that area doesn't match the qualifications as a street. John Morrison, representing Phoenix Conoco, said that portion of street is at least twice as nice of what is called Oak Street on the other side. He also commented on looking at things on a case-by-case basis and not tying future councils to any future projects.

Morrison said he is satisfied with the patch material. Schnell inquired if the City is going to concrete it or is the patch the way to keep it maintained and resolved. Morrison said the patch will have to go to concrete eventually and that is when it is going to have to be included on the One and Six Year plan.

Dean said he was directed to bring back a report on what it would take to make it work and that is what he has done. Morrison said the patch looks great. Discussion was

held on including this area on the One and Six Year plan and whether the City is going to set precedence. Dean and Shoup have talked about that area and at least half of the street will be kept open during the replacement process.

Russell provided an update on the Nebraska 150 Celebration's "Truckin' Through Nebraska: A Mobile Children's Museum". It will be at the Kimball Event Center parking lot on Thursday, June 1st, from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Friday, June 2nd, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Admission is free and the public is encouraged to attend. Russell, Sapp and Kizzair have discussed having an event in the Event Center to go along with this. The City is responsible for providing an on-site coordinator, which will be Russell and Sapp as back-up; security; bathroom facilities – the Event Center bathrooms will be open; parking for the trucks; and volunteers. Twenty volunteers will be needed for Thursday and 10 for Friday. Russell asked if people are interested in volunteering to let her know by May 8th. Warner said she will email the Event Center Committee for volunteers.

Prunty opened discussion on the Memorandum of Understanding for the Mobile Children's Museum between Celebrating Nebraska State (CNS) and the City of Kimball. There being no discussion, Schnell moved and Baliman seconded to authorize the Mayor's signature on the Memorandum of Understanding between Celebrating Nebraska State (CNS) and the City of Kimball. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner, and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Schnell moved the following resolution be approved.

Director and/or Alternate Director to ACE Board of Directors

WHEREAS, the City of Kimball, State of Nebraska, is a party to the Interlocal Agreement creating the Public Alliance for Community Energy and, pursuant to the terms of said Agreement, it is the responsibility of the City to designate a representative of the City of Kimball to the Public Alliance for Community Energy Board of Directors provided for under the terms of said Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Kimball, that:

1. The City Clerk is hereby directed to give written notice to the Public Alliance for Community Energy of the appointment of the Electric Supervisor as the City's representative to said Board of Directors.

Seconded by Warner. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner, and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

The City Council reviewed the following items under the consent agenda:

Baliman moved and Warner seconded to approve the consent agenda items as presented. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.

Dean has been in discussion with Sandhills Energy. They are working on replacing the windmills and will require some agreements with the City. They have sent Dean an interconnection agreement and Dean has sent them a reimbursement agreement for the City's engineering and attorney fees. The agreement is capped at \$35,000.00. In conjunction with this, Sandhills Energy has explained that they would like to locate a transformer next to the City's substation.

Dean reported the City received a letter from NDEQ with regard to a couple violations at the Landfill. The City basically started too soon in the second C & D cell before the first one was closed. The Event Center grant extension was due to expire and the City has received another extension of the grant to May 2018. This gives the City some time to evaluate what they are going to do with the Event Center. Dean, Terrill and Jim Cederburg attended the NMPP Conference in South Sioux City, Nebraska. Dean assisted Sapp and Starr Lehl in conducting some business expansion and retention visits. Dean reported that so far 20 dead tree letters have been sent.

Dean and the Mayor met with the Perry brothers on the Longhorn building as what their direction is for that building. Dean attended a trail committee meeting. Discussion at one time was about working on the Janicek Dam property and construction a trail out there. The City is a most likely candidate to lead that project. Dean volunteered to take the leadership on that unless the council has any objections to that. Warner said that Commissioner Engstrom and County Street Superintendent Hottell have offered their services as well.

Dean reported he had a visit from two high school students that are looking for some projects for community service. He will identify low-risk, little supervision projects for them.

Prunty reported the property owner of the unsafe property at 106 and 106 ½ S. Washington Street has been served. He and Dean have looked around at nuisance properties.

Prunty told council members and the public if they get a chance to look at the new Kimball sign. Prunty reported there will be interviews for the CSO position on Friday. PADD will actually train them as far as nuisances.

The employee appreciation dinner is April 21, 2017 at the Eagles. The Arbor Day Celebration is Friday, April 28, 2017 at 10:00 a.m. in Gotte Park. The next City Council meeting will be held on May 16, 2017 at 6:00 p.m.

There being no further business to come before the Council, Schnell moved and Baliman seconded to adjourn at 8:03 p.m. On roll call vote, the following votes were recorded on the electronic voting board. Aye: Schnell, Shields, Warner, and Baliman. Nay: None. Absent: None. Motion carried.
