Please Pick Up After Your Pet

It doesn't take much to remember that we have pets in our community. In fact, if you don't watch your step, you're liable to step in one such reminder!

Besides being unsightly and smelly, animal waste can be hazardous to the health of our children who play in the community *and* other pets. One of the most common forms of disease transmission between dogs is through fecal matter.

When walking your dog, remember that it should be leashed. **Also, it is important to remember to immediately clean up after your pet.** Take along a baggie with you to pick up waste and then dispose of it properly.

By taking a few simple steps to clean up after your pet, you can contribute not only to the beautification of our community, but also towards the elimination of one of the most irritating nuisances in our community.

Did you know . . .

- ◆ A building permit is required for all construction work including additions, patio covers, carports, fences/walls, accessory buildings.
- ◆ A mobile home permit is required for a mobile home to be placed outside of a Mobile Home Park.
- ◆ A Special Events Permit is required for an event held on City property that will be open to the public.
- ◆ All all-terrain vehicles and utility-type vehicles operated within the corporate limits of the City are required to be registered with the City.
- ◆ Registering your bicycle with the City will greatly assist in its recovery if it is stolen.
- ◆ If you are selling a product door to door or on the street, a peddler's permit is required.
